# Celebrating 30 Years of Woodcroft College Junior School | 1994 - 2024

Woodcroft College first opened in 1989 for high school students, with primary school students joining our community five years later. Our aim then and today is to provide an affordable independent school option for the many families who call the southern suburbs home.

It is hard to believe that three decades have passed since the inception of our Junior School. Over these years, our journey has been one of growth, resilience and unwavering commitment to educational excellence.

Established in 1994 with 90 students from Reception to Year 5, Woodcroft College Junior School emerged as a beacon of educational innovation in our community. From humble beginnings in temporary classrooms, our foundation staff envisioned a nurturing environment where children could flourish academically, socially and emotionally. With determination and foresight, they laid the foundation for the cornerstone of educational excellence in the south.

In the early years, our dedicated faculty worked tirelessly to shape the ethos of our school. Their passion for teaching and unwavering dedication to student success created a culture focused on the whole child that endures today. Together, we fostered a dynamic learning environment where curiosity was celebrated, and every child was empowered to reach their full potential.



As the years passed, Woodcroft College Junior School grew not only in size but also in reputation. At the start of 1999, the Junior School had double streams at all year levels. In 2007, a new Junior School administrative building was completed. This made it possible to expand the library, establish a new art room and improve learning support facilities.

Our commitment to a well-rounded education saw the integration of outdoor learning opportunities, innovative teaching methodologies, cutting-edge technology, and a rich array of extracurricular activities. Whether through sports, the arts or enrichment activities, we instilled in our students and families the values of community connection, a growth mindset, a generous spirit and we inspired confidence.

The spirit of innovation has always been at the heart of our school. We embraced change and continuously adapted to meet the evolving needs of our students and community. From pioneering IT programs to embracing diverse learning needs and traditional aboriginal culture, we sought to equip our students with the skills and perspectives needed to thrive in an everchanging world. In 2005, the Junior School was accredited to deliver the International Baccalaureate Program, which remains today.









When I arrived at Woodcroft College in 2018, it was clear that the Junior School staff had endured the confines of temporary classrooms well beyond their intended lifespan for nearly a quarter of a century. In this same year, I urged the College Council to consider funding the building of a permanent new Early Learning Centre and Junior School building.

After approval to work with the architects on these two projects, it quickly became apparent that a double streamed Junior School would not accommodate the demand that was now flowing from the newly established Early Learning Centre. The decision was made to construct a three-storey building that would allow three classes at each year level.

After many years of careful financial planning, decision-making, discussion and collaboration, we were pleased to open the doors of the new Junior School at the beginning of Term One this year to a record 516 students, coinciding with 30 years of primary schooling at Woodcroft College.

Setting the standard for the future, the Woodcroft College Junior School community is learning, teaching and working within new high-standard facilities that maintain and build upon the already strong sense of connection and pride within our College.

The building includes classrooms, specialist spaces, a library and communal areas, providing a fitting and inspiring environment for each child's Junior School experience.

Our new Junior School is purpose-built to meet the changing needs of our students as they transition through their primary school years. From the ground floor spaces for our Reception and Year 1 students to our Year 6 students inhabiting a wing in the top storey as they prepare for high school.

Our new building provides a unique Magain Performing Arts space, a dedicated Library, Arts and Technology Studio, and Second Language and Science Labs. The Science Lab includes cooking facilities and allows students to interact with a kitchen garden.

Our specialist learning and teaching spaces are no longer shared. This much-needed functional improvement enhances the experiences of both students and specialist teachers.

Keeping the community feel alive, the sense of community that is loved in the Junior School is not lost. We bring all that the Junior School has to offer under one roof.

While the new building is multi-storey, attention has been paid to creating spaces that allow our community to gather, from the central atrium to the courtyard.

Surrounded by space, classrooms are connected by spacious Learning Commons on each level, creating teaching and learning break-out areas. Large sliding doors between spaces give flexibility and a sense of connection.

Access to the outdoors is facilitated with covered outdoor learning areas on every level, providing a natural green environment to support increased focus and attention. Teachers can change the teaching environment and experience for our students. Additional outdoor areas will include a new sports court and a productive garden.

The new Junior School sits alongside our ELC, allowing students to play outside simultaneously. Shared play spaces are divided by a bespoke spiral fence to keep everyone safe.









As we watched the old Junior School transportable classrooms make their way on the back of a truck down Panalatinga Road, they carried memories of perseverance and the anticipation of a brighter future in a more suitable educational environment.

Throughout our journey, the support of our parents, Old Scholars and community partners has been instrumental. Their unwavering belief in our mission and steadfast commitment to our school have been the bedrock of our success. We have created a vibrant community where every voice is valued, and every achievement is celebrated.

As we mark this significant milestone, we reflect on our achievements and the challenges we've overcome. The past 30 years have seen their fair share of trials, but through resilience and determination, we have emerged more robust and more united than ever before.

As we embark on the next leg of our journey, we remain steadfast in our commitment to empowering the next generation of leaders, thinkers and change-makers. With the same spirit of innovation and dedication that has defined us for the past three decades, we look forward to shaping the future of education and making an indelible impact on the world.

In closing, I extend my heartfelt gratitude to everyone who has been a part of this incredible journey. We have built something remarkable together, and I am excited to see where the next 30 years will take us. 












# INVESTING IN PROFESSIONAL LEARNING FOR OUR TEACHERS

Woodcroft College places great value on hiring excellent teachers, followed by support and resources to continue to build excellent classroom practitioners. This includes our Professional Learning Program for our teaching staff.

This program plays a key role in building teacher competency. We want our teachers to feel capable, challenged and supported within their teaching. Just as we do for our students, we focus on building and supporting lifelong learners.

Investing in quality learning opportunities for our staff has a direct impact on the learning experiences of our students in the classroom. Engaged and motivated educators, provide engaging learning experiences for our students.

Each year we plan out a whole staff Professional Learning Program. Our student free days at the start of each term provide the space for our staff to learn and work together.

These learning opportunities align with our strategic priorities as a College. From cultural awareness workshops in line with our Reconciliation Action Plan to wellbeing sessions to support positive mental health, to growth coaching programs to focus on the practice of teaching and building capacity.

We have created Professional Learning Communities which bring together staff across schools, subjects and year levels to focus on our core business of learning and teaching.

Individual staff and faculty teams have the opportunity to apply for relevant learning opportunities throughout the year. Many of our staff willingly devote time outside of school hours to develop themselves professionally.

Some of the professional learning in 2023 included:

- Inclusive Education
- Youth Mental Health First Aid
- VR, AI and Futures
- Nature play
- Literacy programs
- Adolescent Success Conference
- EduTECH Conference

We also had staff presenting at the last two conferences on the list. We appreciate the opportunity to share our work and learnings with other schools both locally and interstate. Last year, 10 teachers across 11 subjects were involved in the final assessment processes of marking and moderation for Stage 2 SACE (Year 12). While providing valuable service to the education community, our teachers are also building upon their understanding of assessment standards at Year 12 level. They are gaining ideas about task design and content delivery that they can bring to their own learning programs in future years.

This year, as part of our spotlight on our Guiding Principle of Future Focused, we have launched the Woodcroft College Leadership Development Program.

Current members of our Senior and Middle Leadership Teams will be engaged in a range of Professional Learning workshops throughout the year. Each team will work with experienced leaders including Dr. Paul Teys, Dr. Neil Carrington and Heather DeBlasio. They will engage with leadership theory and strategy, identifying their individual strengths and learning needs, and building their leadership capacity.

Emerging leaders are also invited to apply to participate and have joined a group of early career leaders. These sessions will be led by our Principal, Shannon Warren. The leadership work is contributing to the development of our Leadership Pillars – a set of leadership attributes valued at Woodcroft. These will also be used in work with our students to develop their leadership skills.

Our Guiding Principles underpin our focus on supporting teacher Growth; providing a vibrant learning Community and opportunities to contribute to this, Agency and ownership of their Professional Learning journey, and an emphasis on being Future Focused to ensure that we remain at the forefront of educational thinking, pedagogy and subject knowledge.

Investing in our teachers ensures that our students are supported by motivated educators, who are equipped with the best educational practice and resources, and who belong to a professional community. Our aim is to ensure that every member of the Woodcroft community has the opportunity to *Find Their Remarkable*.

We were very excited to open our Early Learning Centre for Term 3 in 2020. Fast forward to 2024 and we can celebrate a thriving Centre. We are grateful to our families who recognise the quality of the early education Woodcroft College is providing in the important two years before school.

From structured play-based learning programs, to developing problem solving and reasoning skills, to building positive social skills and establishing connections to take into our Junior School. Our qualified and passionate teachers supported by our specialist teachers, ensure that our youngest learners are in the best possible environment to support their development and growth.

We are pleased to share some of the learning highlights of our ELC students during Semester 2 last year and the beginning of this year.

Their Units of Inquiry in Semester 2 included "Sharing the planet" and "How we express ourselves".

The "Sharing the planet" unit was guided by the students' interests and their voices in deciding the direction of the inquiry. We had Henny Penny hatching chickens visit the ELC to support exploration of lifecycles and how to care for the animals around us.

Our 3-Year-Old Program students had an excursion to the Adelaide Zoo to complete their inquiry around life cycles, habitats and how to care for animals.

In the "How we express ourselves" unit, we invited one of South Australia's premier puppeteers, Sue Harris to share a beautiful incursion with all our students. Puppet Stuff is the journey into the wonderful world of puppets and puppetry. Students were introduced to an array of puppet types and performance styles in an entertaining and informative way.

Puppets were used to show communication through movement without dialogue. Our students watched wonderful theatre created by glove, rod, mouth, shadow, marionette, Bunraku-style and ventriloquist dummy puppets.

The 4-Year-Old Program students went on their excursion to Stage One Dance Studio. They participated in one hour of mixed dance styles from hip hop to ballet, relaxation and meditation to general movement, parachute work and marching.

To start 2024, children have been enjoying music lessons with Middle and Senior School Music teacher Adam Goodburn. It is one of the many benefits of being an ELC to Year 12 school that we can have specialist teachers work across the College and sub-schools.

Adam is engaging our youngest students with music through games, playing instruments and movement. Our students have been introduced to the 'good morning' song. They end their lessons with relaxation and mindfulness while listening to soft background music.

More recently, students enjoyed their inaugural visit to Calvary Aged Care as part of our new intergenerational program.

The joy the visit brought to the residents was very clear and the ELC students were kind, polite and enjoyed playing with the residents.

Research has shown that intergenerational relationships have a profound impact on the health and wellbeing of both younger and older individuals. By bridging the generation gap, we not only create enriching experiences but also promote a sense of belonging and interconnectedness within our community.

The children have also enjoyed watching our Year 8 Drama students perform a clowning routine. The Year 8 drama students spent the term in mime and clowning workshops to build their skills in physical theatre. They were encouraged to incorporate clowning, slapstick comedy and magic tricks into their routines.

We thank our ELC staff for providing many wonderful learning opportunities. We acknowledge the genuine care, connection and sense of belonging they create for our students and families.

Information Technology provided different logistical challenges back then. I remember the trek to the Middle and Senior School Library with my class to collect the ten available laptops. The children carried the laptops back to the classroom to be plugged into an array of power boards. It would take almost the whole lesson for setting up and then returning the laptops to the library!

Reflecting on end-of-year celebrations emphasises the tremendous growth and development at Woodcroft College. Carols Night was in the open air before the covered upper courtyard was built. We had a paved performance area and even added a stage and some microphones! I was the conductor and operator of the CD player providing the accompanying music.

When the gym was built, we moved our end of year events from a large marquee to the gym and later the Mark Porter Hall. At last, we had the luxury of a permanent building structure with seats. These humble beginnings certainly fill me with immense gratitude.

My journey took a new turn when I returned from maternity leave in the role of Enrichment Program Leader. This fulfilled my passion for educating highly able learners. Junior School Coordinator and PYP Coordinator roles followed. I enjoyed wonderful networking opportunities both nationally and internationally.

I became Head of Junior School in 2011 and this marked the beginning of new leadership opportunities. I had the privilege of collaborating with other heads of schools and aspiring leaders across the country. It was an honour to serve as President of the IPSHA (Independent Primary School Heads of Australia), SA Branch.

They want to encourage good habits such as yoga.

As one of our Junior School Captains in 2023, Vidhya was grateful for the opportunity to show and develop her leadership skills. They have both appreciated the opportunity to take part in workshops with students from other schools. They have developed their communication skills and are even more aware of issues that impact children and young people.

It is inspiring to meet young people like Vidhya and Abigail who want to be part of shaping the future. Not only for themselves but for their generation and those that follow.

The course goes beyond the basics, delving into ethical farming practices, sustainable resource use, and the journey from production to plate in both sectors.


